What is the difference between SLES and DES?

Many of our students are at the age where we need to start planning for their post school destinations. Some of our students and their families have already started having these discussions as the time for leaving school comes around too quickly!

The key difference between DES and SLES is the student's current readiness for open employment and the time it might take to prepare students to build independent living and vocational skills. A SLES participant may need up to 2 years to develop the aspiration, confidence and demonstration of skills sufficient to meet DES criteria.

School Leaver Employment Support (SLES) is an early intervention approach for Year 12 school leavers with significant disability to support their transition from school to employment. SLES Outcome: Overcome low expectations (participant, carer, family) and facilitate transition to a DES.

The Disability Employment Services (DES) supports persons with disability to get ready to look for a job, find a job and keep a job. The DES also have a program that is available to students in their last year of school called the DES ESL (Eligible School Leaver) program.

This program is to assist students with disability to transition from school to post-school open employment. For a job seeker to access a DES, they must have a future work capacity, with intervention, of at least 8 hours per week. DES Employment Outcome: Paid employment in a sustainable job. Ongoing employment supports funded by NDIS.


